Dear parents/carers,

Following the Governing Body meeting on Wednesday 20th May, I am writing to update you about school plans to re-open to F1, F2, Y1 and Y6 children.

Although governors are confident that school leaders have a thorough and robust plan to manage the risks of extending the numbers of children and staff in school, they want to proceed with caution especially since there isn't a national test, track and trace system operating. Our Lady and St. Joseph's has never been closed; it has been open for key worker/vulnerable children throughout lockdown only closing for Good Friday and Bank Holiday Monday. This group of children remains a priority. There can be as many as 29 in school on any one day which is approximately 13% of the pupils on roll; this number will increase after half term. The numbers of children in F1, F2, Y1 and Y6 who expressed a wish to return to school would increase the percentage of children in school to over 31% of pupils.

Introducing more children requires careful planning and timetabling. Children are now organised in bubbles; they work, play and eat with the same group or 'bubble' of children every day. More bubbles of children, require more timetabling particularly at the start and the end of the school day. Each bubble will arrive and depart at a different time to allow parents/carers to socially distance and keep bubbles separate.

We need to make sure that we get the reopening of our school right to keep everyone safe. Therefore, school will remain open for the children of key workers and vulnerable **children but will not reopen for any children in F1, F2, Y1 or Y6 on June 1st**. Parents/carers of children in these age groups who expressed an interest in their child returning should have had a letter this morning informing them of this decision. School will introduce new routines from June 1st for the children already in school in preparation for more children to return. Governors will meet again on Wednesday June 3rd to review their decision.

Thank you for your continued support. It is essential that we work together to keep all the members of our school community safe and well.


We all hope the sun continues to shine and that you all have a lovely holiday.
